



September 23 is the Feast Day of Saint Padre Pio

Francesco Forgione, who later became know as Padre Pio, was born in Italy on May 25 more than 130 years ago. He had 1 younger brother and 3 younger sisters. His family were poor farmers and it was his job to look after the sheep. When he was little, he loved to sing, read, pray and play church. Throughout his life, God gave him many gifts—while still a young boy, God gave him the ability to see his guardian angel, Jesus and Mary.

He and his family were Catholics who loved God very much, went to church every day and prayed the rosary nightly. His parents would often tell the children the great stories of the Bible.


When he was 15 years old, he entered a Monastery. When he was 18 years old, Jesus appeared to him. When Jesus left, Francesco miraculously had wounds on his hands, feet and side like those that Jesus received on the cross. This is called the "stigmata" which he had till he died. At the age of 23, he was ordained a priest and chose the name Padre Pio.

He had the gift of being able to heal people. He also had the ability to bilocate, meaning that he could be in two places at once! People loved going to confession to him—they would stand in line for days to see him.

He established a hospital and medical center that are still there today. God called him home when he was 81, and one hundred thousand people came to his funeral. In 2002 Pope John Paul II canonized him a saint.

September 29 is the Feast Day of Saints Michael, Gabriel and Raphael, Archangels.

Saint Maurice and Companions

(died circa 287) Feast Day Sept. 22



In the 5th century, St. Eucherius of Lyons described the legendary martyrdom of Maurice and the Theban Legion, comprised of Christians from Upper Egypt. Maurice was first officer of the legion sent by Emperor Maximilian to Switzerland to put down some rebellious Gauls. When Maximilian ordered the soldiers to sacrifice to Roman gods, Maurice and his legion refused. The outraged emperor ordered "decimation" in which one of every 10 men was killed. When the remainder still would not worship Roman gods, Maximilian had other soldiers massacre the entire legion of 6,000. Though the number may be exaggerated, a martyrdom of some Christian soldiers seems believable. Maurice is a patron saint of all armies, the Swiss Guard and Austria.



PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE COMPARISON // NOV 3, 2020



Compiled by the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops

In keeping with its mission, the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops aims to educate and inform Catholics about a wide range of issues. The information compiled here has been gathered from policies, public statements, official and campaign websites, and other resources, as of September 1, 2020, to help voters form their consciences before voting in November. The issues that appear here do not represent a complete list of issues that may be of importance to Catholics. The FCCB neither supports nor opposes any candidate for public office.

President DONALD TRUMP



Former Vice-President JOE BIDEN



ABORTION

In 2016, <u>Trump said</u> that the overturning of *Roe v. Wade* "will happen automatically...because I am putting pro-life justices on the [U.S. Supreme] Court."

In 2017, <u>Trump signed into law</u> a resolution to allow states to restrict Title X funding for Planned Parenthood and other abortion providers.

According to his website, "As president, <u>Biden will work</u> to codify *Roe v. Wade*, and his Justice Department will do everything in its power to stop the rash of state laws that so blatantly violate the constitutional right to an abortion..."

"As president, <u>Biden will...reverse</u> the Trump Administration's rule preventing Planned Parenthood and certain other family planning programs from obtaining Title X funds."

DEATH PENALTY

In 2020, the Trump Administration presided over five executions (three in July and two in August), the first to be carried out by the federal government in 17 years. Two additional executions are scheduled in September 2020.

According to his website, "<u>Biden will work</u> to pass legislation to eliminate the death penalty at the federal level, and incentivize states to follow the federal government's example. These individuals should instead serve life sentences without probation or parole."

EDUCATIONAL CHOICE

In Februay 2020, Trump said, "Yet, for too long, countless American children have been trapped in failing government schools. To rescue these students, 18 states have created school choice in the form of Opportunity Scholarships... no parent should be forced to send their child to a failing government school."

In January 2020, <u>Biden tweeted</u>, "When we divert public funds to private schools, we undermine the entire public education system. We've got to prioritize investing in our public schools, so every kid in America gets a fair shot. That's why I oppose vouchers."

ENVIRONMENT

<u>Trump has begun</u> the process of withdrawing the U.S. from the Paris Agreement on climate change, an international agreement to reduce global greenhouse gas emissions.

According to his website, a <u>Biden administration will re-enter</u> the Paris Agreement on day one.

ETHICS IN RESEARCH

In 2019, the Trump Administration announced its decision to discontinue research conducted within the National Institutes of Health "involving the use of human fetal tissue from elective abortion".

While serving in the U.S. Senate: In 2007, <u>Biden voted</u> in favor of the Stem Cell Research Enhancement Act of 2007 (S.5), which provides for human embryonic stem cell research. In 1998, <u>Biden voted</u> against the Human Cloning Prohibition Act (S.1601).

GENDER ISSUES

In 2019, the White House confirmed Trump's opposition to the Equality Act, which would add the new terms "sexual orientation" and "gender identity" to the definition of "sex" in federal civil rights laws, and would exempt itself from the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993: "The Trump Administration absolutely opposes discrimination of any kind and supports the equal treatment of all. However, this bill in its current form is filled with poison pills that threaten to undermine parental and conscience rights."

According to his website, <u>Biden believes</u> the <u>Equality Act</u> is the "best vehicle for ensuring equal rights under the law for LGBTQ+ Americans, and will guarantee that LGBTQ+ individuals are protected under existing civil rights laws." Biden lists enacting the Equality Act as a top legislative priority.

DONALD TRUMP

HEALTH CARE ACCESS

According to his website, <u>Trump</u> "repealed the Obamacare individual mandate, expanded plan choices and increased competition to bring down costs for consumers." In June 2020, <u>the Trump administration argued</u> in a legal brief that the entire Affordable Care Act (ACA) should be invalidated. Signed into law in 2010, ACA expanded access to health care coverage for the uninsured.

According to a White House fact sheet, <u>Trump</u> "is using all available means to ensure safe vaccines, therapeutics, and diagnostics are developed, manufactured, and distributed in unprecedented time and scale in response to COVID-19."

According to his website, <u>Biden will protect</u> the Affordable Care Act and build on it by "giving Americans a new choice, a public health insurance option like Medicare; increasing the value of tax credits to lower premiums and extend coverage to more working Americans; [and] expanding coverage to low-income Americans."

According to his website, <u>Biden's COVID-19 plan</u> "ensures the wide availability of free testing; the elimination of all cost barriers to preventive care and treatment for COVID-19; the development of a vaccine; and the full deployment and operation of necessary supplies, personnel, and facilities."

IMMIGRATION/REFUGEES

According to his website, "Upon entering office, <u>President Trump called on</u> Congress to fully fund a wall along the Southern border, to close legal loopholes that enable illegal immigration, to end chain migration, and to eliminate the visa lottery program."

In July 2020, the Trump Administration announced it would reject applications for the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program stating, "...the fact remains that Congress should act on this matter."

The Trump Administration proposes resettling 18,000 refugees under a new refugee ceiling. The number admitted in 2016 was nearly 85,000.

According to Biden's website, "As president, <u>Joe will prioritize</u> a comprehensive immigration reform to finally give 11 million undocumented immigrants a roadmap to citizenship."

In June 2020, <u>Biden stated</u>, "As President, I will immediately work to make [DACA] permanent by sending a bill to Congress on day one of my Administration."

Biden will set the annual global refugee admissions cap to 125,000.

POVERTY

In 2019, the Trump Administration opposed a House-passed bill that would raise the federal minimum wage to \$15, stating, "efforts to reduce taxes, eliminate regulations, and implement fairer trade deals are driving economic growth and increasing workers' take-home pay far more effectively and efficiently than legislation like H.R. 582." The current federal minimum wage is \$7.25 per hour; a number of states and localities have adopted higher rates.

According to Biden's website, "He firmly believes all Americans are owed a raise, and it's well past time we increase the federal minimum wage to \$15 across the country. This increase would include workers who aren't currently earning the minimum wage, like the farmworkers who grow our food and domestic workers who care for our aging and sick and for those with disabilities."

RACIAL EQUITY

In June 2020, <u>Trump announced</u> four steps to address racial inequity and police reform: 1) aggressively pursuing economic development in minority communities; 2) confronting healthcare disparities, including addressing chronic conditions and investing in minority-serving medical institutions; 3) an <u>executive order</u> that will encourage police departments nationwide to meet the most current professional standards for the use of force, including tactics for de-escalation; and 4) renewing a call on Congress to enact school choice.

In a June 2020 op-ed, <u>Biden said</u>, "We should also be directing our resources to actively undo the negative effect systemic racism has had on opportunities for black Americans," citing inequities for African-American entrepreneurs, the gap in home ownership and discriminatory lending practices. <u>Biden also said</u>, "...I'm proposing an additional \$300 million to reinvigorate community policing in our country. Every single police department should have the money it needs to institute real reforms..."

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

In 2017, <u>Trump signed</u> an executive order, which states, "Federal law protects the freedom of Americans and their organizations to exercise religion and participate fully in civic life without undue interference by the Federal Government. The executive branch will honor and enforce those protections."

In response to a July 2020 U.S. Supreme Court ruling preserving the religious liberty of the Little Sisters of the Poor, a <u>White House statement said</u>, "As the Supreme Court has previously stated, protecting the ability of people to worship and live according to the dictates of their conscience is part of 'the best of our traditions."


According to Biden's website, "The Trump-Pence Administration has deliberately and systematically attempted to gut protections for the LGBTQ+ community by carving out broad religious exemptions to existing nondiscrimination laws and policies across federal agencies. <u>Biden will reverse</u> Trump's policies misusing these broad exemptions..."

Regarding the July 2020 ruling, <u>Biden said</u> the decision, "will make it easier for the Trump-Pence Administration to continue to strip health care from women--attempting to carve out broad exemptions to the Affordable Care Act's commitment to giving all women free access to recommended contraception."

Builders of Bridges

"Although there are many reasons to be discouraged, amid many prophets of destruction and condemnation, and so many negative and despairing voices, may you be a positive force, for this society.

Like the engine of a train, may you be the driving force leading all towards their destination.

May you be sowers of hope, builders of bridges and agents of dialogue and harmony."

-Pope Francis, Apostolic Journey, April 29th, 2017

We need now, more than ever, "agents of dialogue and harmony" in every community across our country. So, how can Catholics respond to Pope Francis' call to be these "sowers of hope" that might help heal our communities, when there is so much trying to tear us apart?

Our Catholic tradition has a long history of commitment to human dignity, that requires us to raise our voices when we see injustice happening around us. Our commitment to human dignity is broad and deep. We are called to uphold the dignity of all people: those not yet born, immigrants at the border, those suffering under racist systems that deny their full humanity, the elderly whose lives are not valued, people without proper healthcare, and yes, even those who disagree with us about how to solve the problems our communities face.

In recognizing the need for more agents of dialogue in our communities, USCCB launched an initiative called Civilize It in November of 2019, a year ahead of our now imminent national election. As the bishops state in *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship* (FCFC), "The Church calls for a different kind of political engagement: one shaped by the moral convictions of well-formed consciences and focused on the dignity of every human being, the pursuit of the common good, and the protection of the weak and the vulnerable." (FCFC, no. 14)



Civilize it—page 2

Civilize It calls us to speak truth with love. Civilize It is an opportunity to build bridges in our communities and for each one of us to become an agent of dialogue by avoiding making assumptions about others and resisting hurtful personal attacks when engaged in important, often difficult conversations. Open dialogue requires authentic relationship. We must be willing to listen with an open mind to the experiences which inform the viewpoints of our brothers and sisters. At the same time, we know that not all viewpoints hold the same weight. Those which advocate for the destruction of human lives or uphold racist stereotypes are our responsibility to correct with charity. This is how we are called to love our neighbor.

Loving our neighbor through open dialogue is even more important today, while so many of us are at home more and spending more time interacting virtually. It is often easier to deny the dignity of someone who is not right in front of you. While interacting online, we don't have the benefit of non-verbal cues and body language. And yet our call remains the same: speak the truth with love.

We can be builders of bridges and agents of dialogue, as Pope Francis calls us to be, by adhering to the three tenets of the Civilize It campaign: civility, clarity, and compassion. Here's what each of the components of the pledge invite us to do:

- Civility: Honor the human dignity of the other, recognizing each person and a *beloved* child
 of God. This is especially true for those we find it difficult to love, or even those closest to us,
 within our own families.
- Clarity: Seek understanding first. This might be accomplished by asking ourselves, "How do I enter this conversation? Am I trying to "win" or am I authentically looking to understand the experiences and viewpoints of others?" Assuming a posture of learning from one another often helps.
- Compassion: Be willing to take a step into the life and experiences of another person.
 Are we willing to stand together in the pain or the joy, and to seek commonality and solutions together?

Honoring human dignity means answering the call in our communities to seek solutions as brothers and sisters, united by our care for one another. We are not afraid of tough conversations, but approach one another with civility, compassion, and clarity, sowing the hope we gain from Christ our savior.



Guidelines for Reopening of Mass

At St. Peter Pavilion Chapel

As of May 29, 2020

For St. Peter's Parishioners and Visitors

Welcome back to the public celebration of the Holy Eucharist at St. Peter's Pavilion Church. We give thanks that we are able to join once again as the Body of Christ for communal worship. As you know, these are not normal times and there will be new ways of doing things as we come together for Mass. Every effort is being made to protect you and your loved ones and to respect the sanctity of our liturgical traditions.

We ask that you and your family faithfully adhere to all guidelines put in place for your protection and for all those who gather. Though we face challenging times, we can rest in the comfort and peace that only Christ can give us through the celebration of the Mass as one family.

General Norms

- The parish will follow the orders of the county health authorities and the directives of the Archdiocese of Miami.
- The number of persons allowed to participate at Mass in the Pavilion is from 55 to 110 people (depending on single or double seating) to ensure that the six-foot social distancing may be observed. On-line reservations for Mass may be offered in the future to help with over-flow.
- Ushers will seat the allowed number of persons in the Pavilion. Once capacity is reached, others may hear Mass via video or live stream in their cars (utilizing their own internet access). Holy Communion will be distributed to those in the parking area.
- Weekend Mass on the regular schedule of 8:30 & 11:00am and daily Mass at 9:00 am. The Pavilion Chapel will be used for all Masses.
- The public restrooms will be available for emergency or urgent use only.
- The Parish cleaning teams will be sanitizing pews, entrances, restrooms, and all other facilities before and after Mass.
- Due to our "tent" situation, the Pavilion will be closed after the celebration of daily and weekend Masses and will not be available for personal prayer.
- The Sacrament of Reconciliation is now available with our new plexiglass confessional.

Guidelines for the Assembly

- It is suggested you use your best judgement as it relates to your attending public Mass, considering your health risk. Dispensation for the faithful is still in effect and if you are at risk, you may continue to watch Mass on-line or on television. You may also attend daily Mass in lieu of Sunday, when there is normally less people in attendance.
- If you are sick, have flu-like or COVID-19 symptoms, stay at home. If you are frail because of age or vulnerable because of an underlying condition, or you are a caretaker of someone who is, it might be reasonable for you to stay home. If you are fearful, stay home.
- Parents should seriously consider leaving young children at home due to reported COVID-19 complications for some. Masks are required for the duration of the Mass for any children over the age of 2. There will be no free space available to roam or move about.

- Everyone is required to bring their own mask and wear it correctly for the duration of the Mass. The Usher will check that everyone is wearing one upon entry. Thoroughly wash your hands before Mass and bring sanitizer with you for use during Mass.
- You are required to maintain six feet of distance at all times with others attending Mass. The Usher will direct you upon entry, exit and during Communion. Please listen and comply respectfully to the Usher's requests. They are serving for your protection.
- There will be no missals or handouts; however, an abbreviated version of the Bulletin will be at the exits for you to take yourself. Ushers will use long-handle baskets for the collection. A collection basket will also be at the exit for special or additional contributions.
- You enter the Pavilion at the normal entrance. There will be a seating pattern to maintain proper social distancing. All Mass attendees will be seated according to the parish seating plan by an Usher. People living together in a house may be seated together in "double chairs". Please do not move the chairs.
- You are encouraged to participate in the prayer responses and to listen meditatively to sung prayers and hymns. Simply enjoy being in the presence of the Lord and one another.
- For Communion, persons will come forward in a single line up the center aisle or the pavers aisle to the Celebrant, designated at six-foot intervals. Follow the Usher's instructions for the procession. Masks are worn in the Communion line and then lowered while in line before approaching the Communion Minister. After receiving Communion, the mask is raised immediately. Communion will be received in the hand only.
- An Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will distribute Holy Communion to those listening to Mass in the overflow area/parking lot. Follow the Usher or Parking and Traffic Minister's instructions for the procession and six-foot distancing. Masks are worn in the Communion line and then lowered while in line before approaching the Communion Minister. After receiving Communion, the mask is raised immediately. Communion will be received in the hand only.
- There will be two (2) exits to be used. People seating in the main pavilion area will exit by the entrance. Those seated in the pavers area will exit by the door in front towards the sacristy trailer. The Usher will instruct each row to leave at the appropriate time to maintain distancing. Please do not congregate at the exits.



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
